2. New Library, outside

Visites to Meyersdale stop to admise the beautiful colonial style multi-colored brick building at the corer of Main and Center Streets and wonder what it is.

3. Sign, Library

On closer examination, they can see that it is the home of the Meyersdale Public Library, built in 1984.

4. Library, outside

They note that it is located at the most important street intersection in town, Main Street, and in the middle of town, on Center Street, The only intersection whichhas electrically operated traffic lights in the community. This signifies that it is an important building in the community.

5. SIGN: "Building the New Library"

How it got that way is a fascinating story which we shall try to show you.

6. Stack of books in store

Writing materials have undergone development in history, from clay tablets, papyrus scrolls, parchment and paper. The first printing press came to America in Cambridge, Mass., in 1638. Today, books are being printed by the thousands.

7. Old Library

A library is a place where books, manuscripts, musical scores, newspapers, magazines, films, and other medium of communication are kept for use but not for sale.

8. OLD LIBRARY

A library is a storehouse where information can be found when needed. A library is a fountain where those who are thirsty can find water.

9. SIGN: Founded May 16, 1939

The first public tax-supported library in the United States was started in 1833 in Peterborough, New Hampshire.

After that, the public library movement spread. Over a century later, it came to Meyrsdale.

10. REPUBLIC BBDG.

Meyersdale's public library opened its doors on May 16, x39 1939 in rented quarters on the second floor of the Meyersdale Republic newspaper building.

11. Republic bldg.

The Meyersdale Women's club started it. Volunteers staffed it. 1,533 books were catalogued the first year. In 1963 it was incorporated as the Meyersdale Public Library. It remained at this location for 26years. leaving in 1965.

Lo Tie. Vacant lot

The Second building of the library no longer is in existence. It was the former Lucente building, across Center Street from Baker Chevrolet. It remained there for 13 years. leaving in 1978.

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13. Old Borough Bldg. HAZE	In 1978 the library moved to its third location, on the first floor of the former Meyersdale Elementary School on Main Street, at the invitation of the Borough Council.
14. Old Library inside	Its collection expanded. In 1983, residents borrowd 35,000 books, 1,500 magazines, and listened to 720 record albums.
15. Interior	Librarian Marguerrete Cockley and for part-time librarians were kept busy.
16. Library interior	The library contained 21,000 catalogued items for use by the 7,600 residents of the Myyersdale Area School District. Everything seemed to be going along smoothly.
17. GALLATIN LLO 10	But then a crisis came up. The former Galatin Bank Building was donated jto the borough. The borough council decided to move its offices there and to vacate ke the school building.
18. Old Library hallway	Now what was the library supposed to to do? It had several alternatives. One possibility was to stay where it was. It would have an immense building to take care of, EMMSKIANINGXMAINTEREXEXPERSE, and a big heating bill. Another alternative was to find another building suitable to its needs.
19. Wagon in parade	After much deliberation, the Library Board of Directors decided to build its own new building. To the left of the horses is the Stephens Lot, at the coenrerof Mainand Center Streets, which was purexx purchased. The Paper Lot
20. SKETCH	Architect Robert Shallop of Duncansville was commissioned to design a building. He submitted this sketch.
21. MermanxRashwrex Hungry Bookworm 22. Herman Bashore	Another big question: Where was the money to come from. A campaign to rise raise \$150.000 was started. Herman Bashore was named general chairman. He requited a staff of energetic workers.
23. ALL-America sign	Mr. BAshore spoke to many civic organizations. He reminded then and their excellent volunteer efforts in the past had resulted in Meyersdale being named an All-America city in 1982.
24. FAIR	This volunter spirit is seen in many community activities, Such as the Somerset County Fairnow in its 85th year.
25. Hospital	Thexement community built a hospital in 1948.
26. Summerfest	It has an active hospital suxiliary, which sponsors a summer est in June of each year.
