

PARADE AND SPEECHES TO AID THE WAR CHEST

At Last Hour It Was Decided
to Hold a Patriotic Demon-
stration Here To-morrow

SOLDIERS WILL SPEAK

The wind up of the campaign to fill the War Chest will be made with a big demonstration here tomorrow afternoon when it's hoped committee will be able to announce that the Conshohocken's have completed their quota of \$100,000, which means \$10 per capita to be paid within a year, to the War Chest for the relief of the soldiers and sailors.

The demonstration has been hastily arranged and as there is no time to send out special invitations to the various organizations to join in the parade, a general invitation is extended through the Recorder for all to participate.

John Pugh will be chief marshal and he requests the firemen and all other organizations to turn out and make a good showing for the cause of helping the boys who are in the service. The Red Cross Chapters of this borough and W. Consohocken. The Consohocken band will furnish music.

All paragonists are requested to report at First avenue and Harry street, at 2.30 o'clock for location in line. The parade will move promptly at 3 o'clock over the following route: to Fayette street to Twelfth avenue, counter-march to Third avenue and dismiss.

From 2 until 2.30 o'clock the Conshohocken band will give a concert at First avenue and Fayette street and there will be several short addresses.

A meeting will be held at the H-

library grounds after the parade. Two soldiers will make addresses as will Howard Butcher, of Ardmore, who has recently returned from France where he served as a Y. M. C. A. secretary. He will tell of the great work the Y. M. C. A. and kindred organizations are doing at the seat of war.

An Italian Meeting.

The local Italians will hold a mass meeting tonight at First avenue and Maple street, in the interest of the War Chest. There will be music and two prominent Italians will make addresses.

The War Chest campaign committee is very confident of raising the quota

of \$100,000. Last night the campaigners for pledges reported they had received pledges in the amount of \$59,349.54 and big work will be done today and tomorrow to complete the quota.

All of these butchers killed their own beef and on Monday the steers were driven to these three places. All three places have been out of business for some time Mr. Levan and Mr. Daly have been dead for several years although both retired from business a number of years before their deaths. Mr. Movida retired from business about a year ago but during the recent years that he was in the business he bought all of his meat ready dressed.

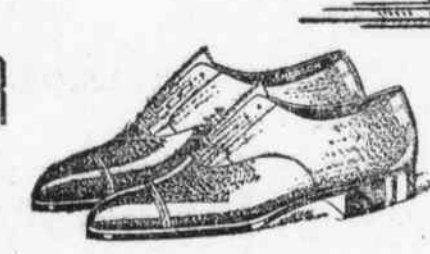

The Women Want a Market.

When the women go after a thing, they usually get it. Just now they are trying to have a curb market established here and have secured many signatures to a petition to be presented to Town Council asking Council's aid in establishing such a market.

Many times an agitation has been started for a curb market, but these have been engineered by men and nothing has resulted. The women are the buyers. They know what they want and have now gone on record as desiring to buy at home. They want fresh fruits and vegetables direct from the farms and desire to buy of the farmer.

To obtain the market, the women must do more than petition Town Council, they must interest the nearby farmers and this can be easily done by showing them they can do business here. Council, undoubtedly, will give every aid to the market in so far as police regulations are concerned and as to the use of the streets.

Such a market would greatly benefit the town. It would give the townspeople the opportunity to purchase fresh farm and dairy products direct and would bring regularly into town a number of farmers, who would end their market days with purchasing their home supplies from the local merchants.

Fill the War Chest.

An appeal is being made, this week, to the people of Philadelphia, Delaware, Chester, Bucks and Montgomery counties to their patriotism. The people are asked as the soldiers have been asked to give! This is war chest week. A week set apart for the people to give thought and to realize what sacrifices the soldiers are called upon to make and what, we, at home, who are secure from the horrors of war, should do to make the sacrifices of the soldiers more bearable.

This week, the people are not asked to save money. They are asked to give money. They are asked to do their bit for the soldiers that they may be fit to do their part in the great struggle where the giving up of life is a common sacrifice.

The war chest is an idea conceived to do away with continuous campaigning for funds for war aid and relief work. The war chest is to supply funds needed by the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., K. of C., Y. M. H. A., W. C. T. U., the Salvation Army and other organizations doing an active work for the soldiers in camps here and abroad and at the battle fronts. The war chest idea was conceived that the various organizations would not have to conduct individual campaigns, thus saving the expenses of many campaigns and the time and energy of the people. In other words, the war chest is a big, single drive for funds for all the war relief organizations, which are doing a work of humanity on the battlefields and making more bearable the hardships endured by the soldiers and sailors.

The boys are giving their all. We must give money and prove to the boys they are not sent into the shambles to be forgotten.

Many Conshohocken boys are now "overthere". Let their every visit to a rest place be made happy by the knowledge that the folks at home have aided in making such places possible.

The Primary Results.

The result of Tuesday's primaries was a decisive victory for the regular Republican organization which nominated its choice of candidates for State officers and its Congressional nominees. It was a clean-cut victory leaving no room for excuses by the factionalists for their poor showing. The Republican voters registered their opinions in such a strong and certain manner that there is now no question that Insurance Commissioner Ambler and his adherents will not dominate Montgomery county affairs.

For sometime past the followers of the Commissioner have recognized him as the leader of the Montgomery county Republicans. The claim was never admitted by the rank and file of the party and in the elections when factionalism has divided the ranks, some of Mr. Ambler's candidates have been successful. On Tuesday, the question of leadership was decisively settled and Mr. Ambler was rejected.

Mr. Ambler brought about the test himself by going before the voters as a candidate for office. He was deemed the strongest man in his faction of the party, but this, also, proven to be a mistaken judgment.

Mr. Ambler is a member of the Governor's cabinet and with a change in the State administration, next winter, Mr. Ambler's control of state patronage will have ceased and as a defeated candidate, he will have no prestige with the new administration. His opposition to the successful congressional nominees will bring him no favors from that quarter. The candidates for assembly and the State committee whom he favored went down to defeat with him, as did a number of members of the county committee.

The defeat of Mr. Ambler and his candidates was so overwhelming as to sound the death knell of his faction.

The time has now arrived to rehabilitate the county organization. It is time that factionalism cease and all Republicans get to gether in support of the candidates nominated to elect them in November, and to place the best men in the field as candidates for county offices next year, and to give each section proper representation.

OPPOSES CONSOLIDATING SCHOOLS

Editor of Conshohocken Recorder:

Dear Sir:
Putting the cart before the horse, is about the way consolidation of schools, work in the country districts, if the truth were told about the matter, it don't work well. It was an unadvised and unasked for piece of legislation, on the part of law makers. The needs of the rural districts, were, and are not fully understood by those who in their educational errors seem to think the city and country alike conditioned. Long and Iowa have been the complaints of those whose schools have been vacated and the pupils forced to go long distances to attend so called consolidated structure. The needs of transportation need not be mentioned here, save to note the intense cold in winter, the cause of much suffering. The late Dr. Dixon wrote he would not want to see any more Consolidated schools built, until transportation was different, not to mention the unnecessary cost to taxpayers, who have a right to be considered.

The fight for repeal of any law, is a great object lesson. The New York Assembly, voted 157-36 to repeal the Machold consolidated school law. Mr. Machold, himself, who introduced the bill, voted for its repeal, convinced that it did not work out as it was expected.

So should Pennsylvania work for the repeal of the school code, which embodies German ideas and should be eliminated from the statute books.

The taxpayers of every township should organize and ask their representatives for repeal. The human element, is the influence that will win the repeal of any law that embodies autocracy imposed in our school system.

The country school house is a community asset, and its students have worked their way to the top round of the ladder, in every business and profession in the country. Why change it? Why bond the township? The district school should be managed by the district, it is the bulwark of pure Democracy. Every farm is depreciated in value, where the district school is vacated and an inflation on those near the consolidated structure. This is unfair, unjust, and should not be tolerated. I would not buy a property in a district where my children would have to be transported to school.

This is an important question, and should be considered by every one.

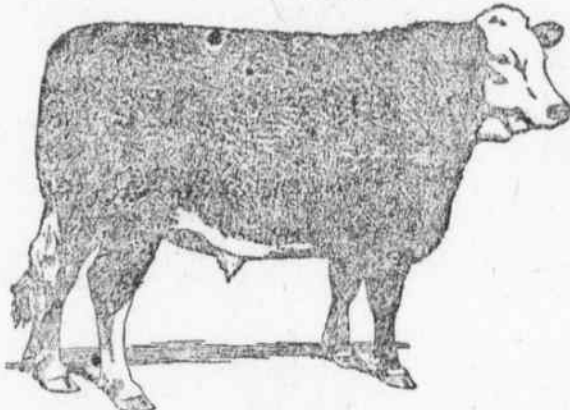

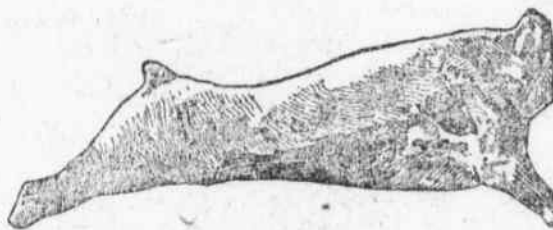
