

## LOCAL MAN HOLDS U. S. A CRUSHING DEFEAT STAMP SALES RECORD FOR AMBLER TICKET

Letter Carrier Allen Koch Sells \$16,695.50 in War Stamps in One Day. Leads Country

### BEATS THE CALIFORNIAN

Conshohocken holds the record for the entire United States for War Stamp sales made by one man in one day.

Allen Koch letter carrier of Conshohocken Post Office has broken all records for the sale of war stamps in one day, by one man. His sales on last Saturday the last day of "Pledge Week" \$16,695.50 the record made heretofore having been held by a letter carrier of Fresno, California with sales of \$9,436. Mr. Koch has been very assiduous in the sale of stamps during the whole year and especially so during Pledge Week. He is now striving to make a new record for the years' sales.

To day the town has subscribed more than one half its quota of \$160,000 and there is not doubt the quota will be exceeded by the end of the Loan.

Borough and County Give Big Majorities Against Amblerites—Hamilton's Fine Run

### BOYD'S MAJORITY 3000

The Ambler faction in the Republican party suffered an overwhelming defeat in Tuesday's primaries in the county and in every legislative district. Insurance Commissioner Ambler was defeated for the nomination for State Senator by James S. Boyd, of Norristown, by over 3000 votes.

Jacob Hamilton, of this borough, candidate for the Assembly nomination, won a decisive victory over Samuel Roberts, of Norristown. Hamilton getting a majority in every district comprising the legislative district.

Congressman Watson will again be the Republican nominee to succeed himself, winning this county over Fletcher Stites, of Narberth, by 1706 and over 2000 in Bucks county.

The Ambler faction's bitterest blow was losing their candidate for the legislature in the First district, where their greatest strength is. Pike won over Mebus by 66 majority. The organization acknowledged the fight would be a close one but conceded the chances favored Mebus.

Conshohocken gave a large vote for the organization candidates and J. Denny O'Neill, who addressed a meeting here shortly before the primaries was the worst defeated man on the ticket. His vote in the town being 205 to 667 for Sproul. John R. K. Scott the Vare candidate for Lieutenant Governor received 169 votes to 625 for Beidleman. Scott's strength was in the Third and Fifth wards.

Stites put up the best fight on the Ambler ticket. He recently met many people here in speaking for the various war aid campaigns and in a local church. He headed the Ambler ticket with 382 votes. Watson carried every ward as did all the other organization candidates, and had a majority in the town of 168.

Boyd received a fine vote in each ward and polled 594 votes to Ambler's 351.

Hamilton's home ward, the Fifth gave him an exceptional vote. The Ambler workers but up a hard fight for all their candidates but Hamilton's friends hung up the big majority of 116 for him. Hamilton had a majority of 385 in the town. His run in the district was also an exceptional one. He won Norristown, carrying 12 of the 17 districts, by a majority of 391. Boyd carried every Norristown district and got a majority of 967 beating Ambler over 2 to 1.

Watson also carried Norristown and had a majority of 618.

In every ward here the Ambler faction put up candidates for ward committee and all were defeated. In the First ward, ex-Assemblyman William Neville, who was an active Ambler worker and had been ward committee for several years, was opposed by the organization candidate William Herron. Neville was defeated by a vote of 85 to 56. Another spirited fight was in the Fifth ward where Al. Ryan ran against Alex. Long, who has been committee man for years. Long won by 81 majority. In the Fourth ward, Councilman Oscar Freas made an attempt to gain a membership in the county committee for the Ambler side but was defeated by Edward Bailey, who had a majority of 39. There were also fights in the Second and Third wards but School Directors, James M. Morrison and Ralph N. Campbell easily won. Morrison having a majority over Tomlinson of 78, beating him over 4 to 1, and Campbell had a majority of 67 over Harvey Campbell.



All of these butchers killed their own beef and on Monday the steers were driven to these three places. All three places have been out of business for some time Mr. Levan and Mr. Daly have been dead for several years although both retired from business a number of years before their deaths. Mr. Mowlds retired from business about a year ago but during the recent years that he was in the business he bought all of his meat ready dressed.

**The Women Want a Market.**

When the women go after a thing, they usually get it. Just now they are trying to have a curb market established here and have secured many signatures to a petition to be presented to Town Council asking Council's aid in establishing such a market.

Many times an agitation has been started for a curb market, but these have been engineered by men and nothing has resulted. The women are the buyers. They know what they want and have now gone on record as desiring to buy at home. They want fresh fruits and vegetables direct from the farms and desire to buy of the farmer.

To obtain the market, the women must do more than petition Town Council, they must interest the nearby farmers and this can be easily done by showing them they can do business here. Council, undoubtedly, will give every aid to the market in so far as police regulations are concerned and as to the use of the streets.

Such a market would greatly benefit the town. It would give the townspeople the opportunity to purchase fresh farm and dairy products direct and would bring regularly into town a number of farmers, who would end their market days with purchasing their home supplies from the local merchants.

**Fill the War Chest.**

An appeal is being made, this week, to the people of Philadelphia, Delaware, Chester, Bucks and Montgomery counties to their patriotism. The people are asked as the soldiers have been asked to give! This is war chest week. A week set apart for the people to give thought and to realize what sacrifices the soldiers are called upon to make and what, we, at home, who are secure from the horrors of war, should do to make the sacrifices of the soldiers more bearable.

This week, the people are not asked to save money. They are asked to give money. They are asked to do their bit for the soldiers that they may be fit to do their part in the great struggle where the giving up of life is a common sacrifice.

The war chest is an idea conceived to do away with continuous campaigning for funds for war aid and relief work. The war chest is to supply funds needed by the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., K. of C., Y. M. H. A., W. C. T. U., the Salvation Army and other organizations doing an active work for the soldiers in camps here and abroad and at the battle fronts. The war chest idea was conceived that the various organizations would not have to conduct individual campaigns, thus saving the expenses of many campaigns and the time and energy of the people. In other words, the war chest is a big, single drive for funds for all the war relief organizations, which are doing a work of humanity on the battlefields and making more bearable the hardships endured by the soldiers and sailors.

The boys are giving their all. We must give money and prove to the boys they are not sent into the shambles to be forgotten.

Many Conshohocken boys are now "overthere". Let their every visit to a rest place be made happy by the knowledge that the folks at home have aided in making such places possible.

**The Primary Results.**

The result of Tuesday's primaries was a decisive victory for the regular Republican organization which nominated its choice of candidates for State officers and its Congressional nominees. It was a clean-cut victory leaving no room for excuses by the factionalists for their poor showing. The Republican voters registered their opinions in such a strong and certain manner that there is now no question that Insurance Commissioner Ambler and his adherents will not dominate Montgomery county affairs.

For sometime past the followers of the Commissioner have recognized him as the leader of the Montgomery county Republicans. The claim was never admitted by the rank and file of the party and in the elections when factionalism has divided the ranks, some of Mr. Ambler's candidates have been successful. On Tuesday, the question of leadership was decisively settled and Mr. Ambler was rejected.

Mr. Ambler brought about the test himself by going before the voters as a candidate for office. He was deemed the strongest man in his faction of the party, but this, also, proven to be a mis-taken judgment.

Mr. Ambler is a member of the Governor's cabinet and with a change in the State administration, next winter, Mr. Ambler's control of state patronage will have ceased and as a defeated candidate, he will have no prestige with the new administration. His opposition to the successful congressional nominees will bring him no favors from that quarter. The candidates for assembly and the State committee whom he favored went down to defeat with him, as did a number of members of the county committee.

The defeat of Mr. Ambler and his candidates was so overwhelming as to sound the death knell of his faction.

The time has now arrived to rehabilitate the county organization. It is time that factionalism cease and all Republicans get together in support of the candidates nominated to elect them in November, and to place the best men in the field as candidates for county offices next year, and to give each section proper representation.

**OPPOSES CONSOLIDATING SCHOOLS**

Editor of Conshohocken Recorder:

Dear Sir:  
Putting the cart before the horse, is about the way consolidation of schools, work in the country districts, if the truth were told about the matter, it don't work well. It was an uncalculated and unasked for piece of legislation, on part of law makers. The needs of the rural districts, were, and are not fully understood by those who in their educational efforts seem to think the city and country alike conditioned. Long and stout have been the complaints of those whose schools have been vacated and pupils forced to go long distances to attend so called consolidated structure. The needs of transportation need not be mentioned here, save to note the intense cold in winter, the cause of much suffering. The late Dr. Dixon wrote he would not want to see any more Consolidated schools built, until transportation was different, not to mention the unnecessary cost to taxpayers, who have a right to be considered.

The fight for repeal of any law, is a great object lesson. The New York Assembly, voted 157-36 to repeal the Machold consolidated school law. Mr. Machold, himself, who introduced the bill, voted for its repeal, convinced that it did not work out as was expected.

So should Pennsylvania work for the repeal of the school code, which embodies German Keas and should be eliminated from the statue books.

The taxpayers of every township should organize and ask their representatives for repeal. The human element, is the influence that will win the repeal of any law that embodies autocracy imposed in our school system.

The country school house is a community asset, and its students have worked their way to the top rung of the ladder, in every business and profession in the country. Why change it? Why bond the township? The district school should be managed by the district, it is the buttmark of pure democracy. Every farm is depreciated in value, where the district school is vacated and an inflation on those near the consolidated structure. This is unfair, unjust, and should not be tolerated. I would not buy a property in a district where my children would have to be transported to school.

This is an important question, and should be considered by every one.


