Two Conshohocken fishermen were in a party of four that ran into a school of rockfish on a trip Wednesday and succeeded in bringing home 38, averaging from 10 to 12 pounds apiece. The men fished in the Chesapeake Bay, chartering out of Rockhill, Maryland. Local fishermen were Donald Auch and Charles Eddy.

Eddy said the party encountered a school running about 100 feet

offshore on the second turn of the tide. The captain cut down the boat's engine and drifted with the school.

Coming to the surface to feed, Eddy said the fish at several times were so dense at the surface that they splashed water onto the deck of the 30-foot boat.

Rockfish are usually caught on the turn of the two tides, from around six to nine in the morning, and from about five to eight p. m. The morning trip netted nothing. After lunch ashore the party went out again to spot a school feeding when the tide turned. A number of other boats viewed through field glasses appeared to be having slim luck, a situation Auch and Eddy have experienced a number of times in the same area.

When the rockfish, also called striped bass, were running the thickest, Eddy suggested trying to net some. The boat captain advised that wetting fish that size wasn't practical because they would get out of the hand net.

Bait used was a bucktail, made of hair. Whereas a strip of pork rind is often used on the hook, the fish were taking the bucktail without the rind Wednesday.

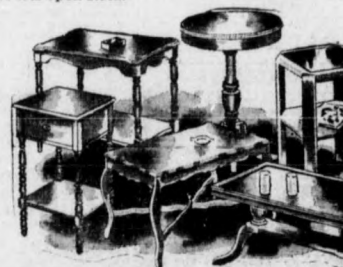

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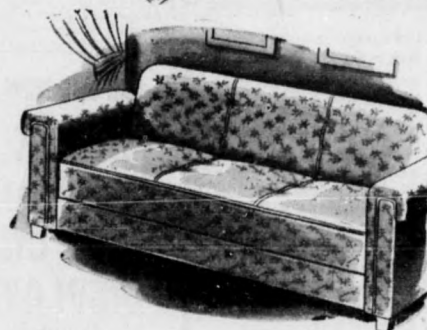
