

Two More Teachers Resign

Vincent Bonkoski Successor Chosen At High School

Two more teachers resigned from the faculty of the Conshohocken public schools at a meeting of the School Board Monday night. They are William C. Holopecer, of Philadelphia, instructor of art for the last three years, and Miss Norma Barlow, Philadelphia, teacher of the first grade. The latter has accepted a teaching post in the Lower Merion public grade schools. No successors were named.

Seven teachers have submitted resignations in the local public school system since June. Two vacancies arising from resignations accepted at June and July meetings, were filled.

Harold S. Merwin, Drexel Hill, a teacher of English in Temple University High School for six years, was elected head of the English department and English instructor in the local public school system for several years.

Mrs. Hipple has taken a post in the new Whitmarsh-Plymouth high school, scheduled to open next month.

Mervin holds an A.B. degree from Dickinson College, took graduate work at Drew University, and is working for a first grade degree. His salary was set at \$3800-\$73 a week.

Elected guidance counselor and instructor of guidance was Ernest O. Puchard of Havertown. Possessing a master of science degree from the University of Pennsylvania, a B.S. degree in secondary education from West Chester State Teachers College, he was a member of the Philadelphia public school system faculty for four years. His salary, \$4000.

Puchard succeeds the late Vincent Bonkoski, guidance counselor and football coach, whose death occurred suddenly last June 22.

Bonkoski also coached football. Puchard is scheduled to perform athletic service.

Still to be filled are the vacancies of a union spokesman said.

Lavino Grants Pay Increase

Offer of 8 1/2 Cents Accepted by Union

A wage increase of 8 1/2 cents per hour has been granted 400 employees of E. J. Lavino Co., refractories, Plymouth Meeting, in a new one-year contract.

The 1952-53 contract expired Friday, but was extended until Tuesday night. The contract was reopened for wage adjustments exclusively, a union spokesman said.

After asking a wage increase of 15 cents per hour, the union members voted for acceptance of the 8 1/2-cent increase at a Monday night meeting at the Moose Hall, Norristown, for day shift workers and Tuesday morning for night shift workers.

Per Capita Tax Lifted for 100 Past 70th Year

'They've Paid It 50 Years, That's Enough' - Ristine

The Conshohocken School District gave a birthday present worth \$10 Monday night to about 100 residents of the borough who became 70 on or before July 1.

The directors, at a monthly meeting at Conshohocken High School, lifted responsibility for payment of an annual \$10 per capita tax in the 70 years or older age bracket. The action was believed the first of its kind in the history of the public school system locally.

Irvine Ristine, treasurer, introduced the new measure, which was quick and unanimous support.

'Residents of Conshohocken, who are now 70, have paid taxes nearly 50 years. I believe they should not be required to pay per capita taxes any longer,' Ristine said.

Only requirement to procure examination is that birth certificates or some other documentary evidence of the date of birth be presented to Dr. Robert C. Landis, superintendent of schools, at the high school offices before October 3.

Dr. W. P. Ciesielski made the motion for exoneration of elderly persons. The second was by John H. Hoyes.

Provision was made to refund the \$10 per capita tax to any person who reached the age of 70 on or before July 1, and can give verification.

Collections during the first month since the new 1953-54 school tax duplicate was issued July 1, are running \$1900 higher than the same time last year, the treasurer told the board.

Amount of the duplicate is \$189,511.45. Of the total to be collected the sum of \$33,226.64 has already been paid on property taxes and the sum of \$12,220 on per capita assessments.

Staff Visits Welcomed by Publisher

H. B. Heywood Often Entertained His Employees

The death of Harry B. Heywood early last night at his home on DeKalb Pike, Gwynedd, marked the passing of a civic leader who spent his life in the interest of Conshohocken and its residents.

Associated with him from February 10, 1896, until he retired in 1946, he was treated as almost one of the family. After he removed from Conshohocken his interest in the employes seemed to deepen.

Frequently he visited at his home, not one or two at a time but frequently the entire staff, to spend the evening with him.

No longer in robust health, he would rest during the afternoon so that he would be able to get full enjoyment from our visit. His interest in 'The Recorder', after he retired, was just as keen as when he was the owner and publisher. He would want to know exactly how the various departments were operating. When time came to leave he insisted we be in no hurry and his parting salute invariably was "Don't leave it too long to come up again."

I visited him several times after he became bedfast. It was indeed hard to realize his long and vigorous life was nearing an end. The enjoyment of the visit had washed although it was a privilege to grasp his hand. My last visit was about a month ago. I felt that I should not disturb him but when he knew I was there he insisted I go to his bedside.

Harry B. Heywood enjoyed the respect of the entire community. He was born in Conshohocken, grew up with the town. He was a personal friend of the manufacturers, professional and business men as well as those who worked hard for a livelihood. He took a deep interest in civic and political affairs. He gave the support of his paper to any movement for borough betterment and for any candidate for office whom he felt was qualified.

Repeating a request that the State Highway Dept. repair the treacherous state-owned stretch of Fairfield Road, from Sandy Road to Luetta Ave. and also Conshohocken Road, commissioners were told that no funds are available for the work.

 Roxborough, about 20 years ago, he continued publication of that weekly newspaper until retirement. For many years, he also published a weekly newspaper, the Times Chronicle, in Jenkintown. His home was in that community for many years.

Winning state-wide recognition as a newspaper publisher, he served as vice president of the Pennsylvania Newspaper Publishers Association in 1930, and he was one of its earliest members.
 A founder and president for 25 years of the Montgomery County Newspaper Association, predecessor of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Newspaper Publishers Association, he treasured among his choicest a hand-lettered illuminated scroll, with the signature of every member of the association appended, which was presented to him at his voluntary retirement from office a decade ago.

Selected as an outstanding newspaper publisher of Pennsylvania, Mr. Heywood was signaled out for special honors at an annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Newspaper Publishers Association and allied organizations at State College, some years ago.
 Born in Conshohocken, Dec. 6, 1865, he was the son of the late William and Sarah Heywood. He was graduated from Conshohocken High School and he served as bookkeeper for a tin ware manufacturing firm in Philadelphia before he entered the publishing business.
 Appointed postmaster of Conshohocken on February 18, 1907, by late President Theodore Roosevelt, he filled the post for two four-year terms, serving under three presidents. His second appointment came from President William H. Taft. He also served part of his

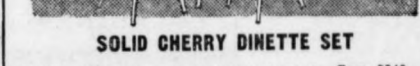

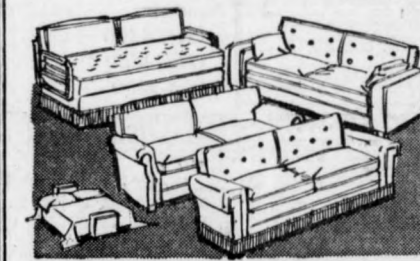
