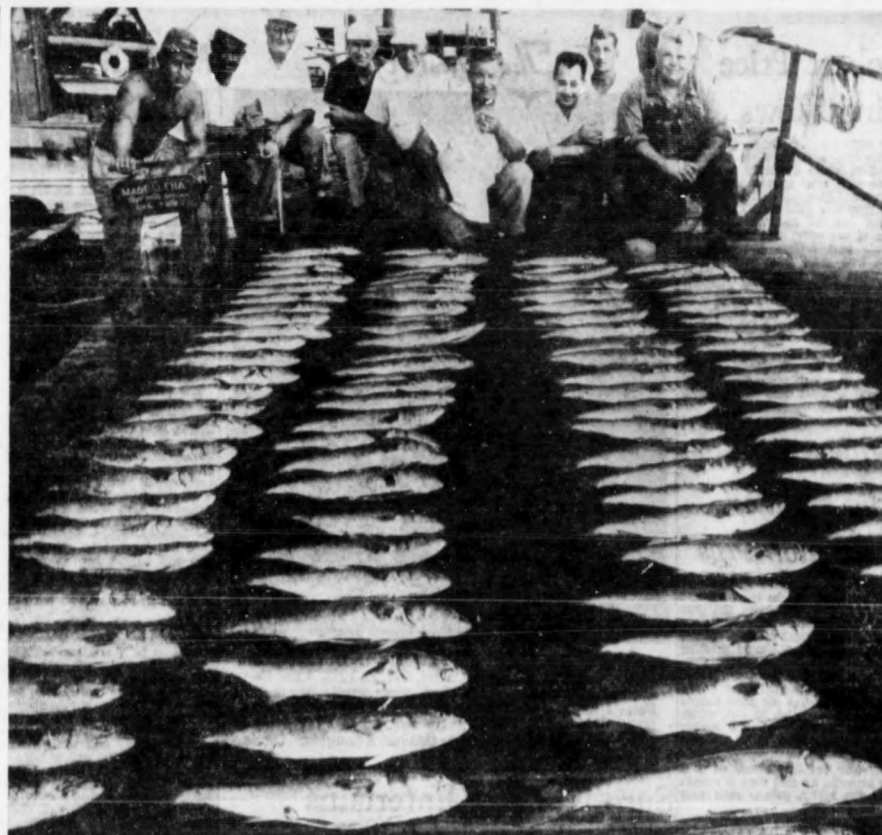

Firemen Aid Stricken Area Washies Help Clear Debris at Yardley

Conshohocken — Tears came into the eyes of the woman occupant of a Yardley home, when members of the woman occupant of a Yardley home, when members of the Washington Fire Co. arrived Sunday morning to lend volunteer aid.

"You are the first to help us," said the woman, whose home along the Delaware River was made almost unrecognizable by flood waters, 10 days earlier.

Ted Lesinski, captain of the company's rescue squad, said the water had reached to the roof of the house, had ruined virtually all the furnishings and had deposited more than a foot of silt and mud in the basement.

"Some of our group who had been all through the war and had seen plenty of damage, said they never saw anything just like it," Lesinski said. In addition to the devastation caused by the raging waters, lime sprayed over the area as a disease preventative, adds to the unsightly appearance of the once beautiful countryside.

Leaving here at 7, the 12 "Washies" members worked steadily until after 5, taking time out only for a meal, served them by the Red Cross, and for inoculation shots against typhoid, required of all workers.

"Two additional booster 'shots' will be given the group here," Lesinski said. The men went to the flood-stricken area after Lesinski telephoned the Yardley mayor that they were anxious to help. The mayor's answer was "we can use all the men you have."

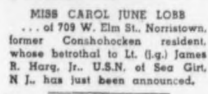

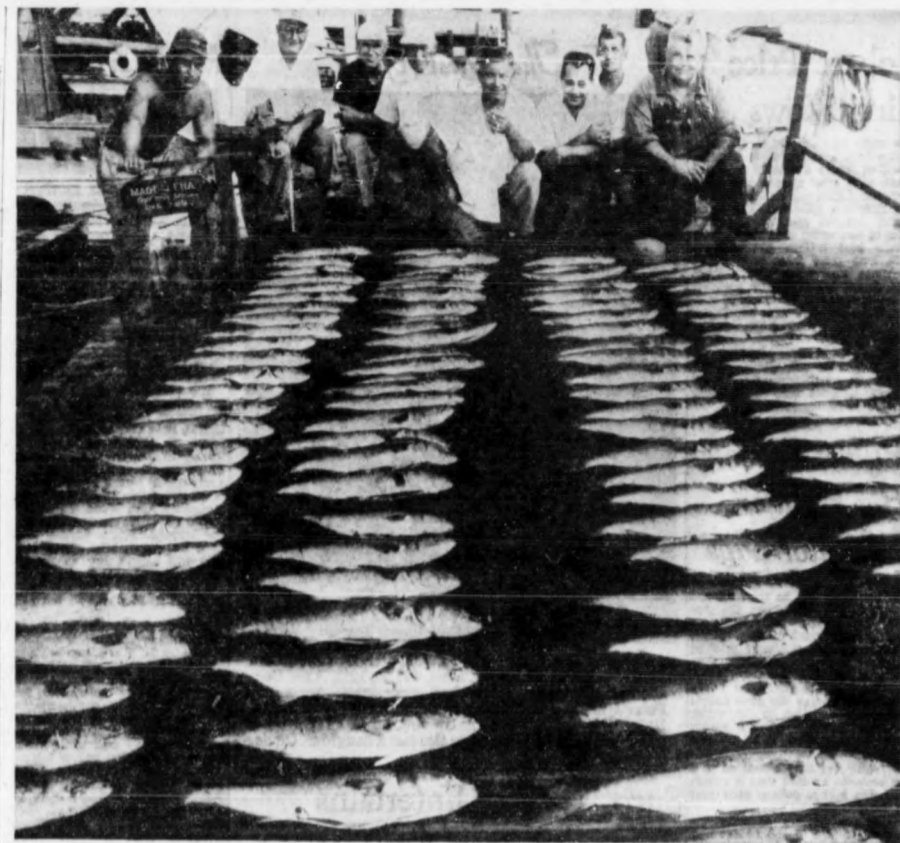

Firemen Aid Stricken Area Washies Help Clear Debris at Yardley

Conshohocken — Tears came into the eyes of the woman occupant of a Yardley home, when members of the Washington Fire Co. arrived Sunday morning to lend volunteer aid. "You are the first to help us," said the woman, whose home along the Delaware River was made almost unrecognizable by flood waters, 10 days earlier. Ted Lesinski, captain of the Washington Co. and head of the company's rescue squad, said the water had reached to the roof of the house, had ruined virtually all the furnishings and had deposited more than a foot of silt and mud in the basement.

"Some of our group who had been all through the war and had seen plenty of damage, said they never saw anything just like it," Lesinski said. In addition to the devastation caused by the raging waters, lime sprayed over the area as a disease preventative, adds to the unsightly appearance of the once beautiful countryside. Leaving here at 7, the 12 "Washies" members worked steadily until after 5, taking time out only for a meal, served them by the Red Cross, and for inoculation shots against typhoid, required of all workers. Two additional booster "shots" will be given the group here. The men went to the flood-stricken area after Lesinski telephoned the Yardley mayor that they were anxious to help. The mayor's answer was "we can use all the men you have."

Accompanying Lesinski were Watson Hyinski, a company lieutenant; Anthony Raush, John Rice, Watsy Davidiak, Pete Silvestry, George Reustle, Ted Kosak, Lou Hale, Ted Lesinski, Jr., Frank Altman and Carl Hyinski. Drill practice Sunday for the company's participation in the Atlantic City firemen's parade, Sept. 17, prevented a larger number of volunteers from responding.

The Fountain Walk on Water Today—How Can That Be Done?

A layman's views by Harold McCuen

A news commentator said on Sunday afternoon the flood that hit seven states two weeks ago was the worst disaster of its kind since Noah.

I wouldn't know. And he probably didn't realize the scope of death and damage in the wake of the flood in which Noah and those aboard the ark were the only persons who survived.

It is somewhat a reflection upon mankind that with all claim to progress we have not prepared ways and means of escaping a flood. Considered in the light of destruction in Noah's time, the recent floods were a mild stream, flowing in a relatively small area, killing only about 210 persons, and resulting in damages estimated so far at less than two billion dollars.

Turbulent waters are awesome, and strong men often die fighting the raging sea or swollen rivers gone on rampage. But smashing, terrifying breakers can serve to emphasize the beauty of Scripture highlighting still waters and a calm sea. "He leadeth me beside the still waters..." And remember how He quelled the angry waves by speaking a few words? He saved a disciple from drowning after his faith weakened while he was walking on water on the way to the Master aboard a ship sailing a troubled sea.

Undertow and mountainous breakers are something we must buck day by day. To be smashed by swirling tides, or caught by an undertow and dragged out to sea we need not go near the ocean, or down to the sea in ships. Often while we are on the job, or in the home or office, problems strike with suddenness and terror equal to the intensity and grimness of the restless, turbulent sea, accompanied by a destructive force capable of splitting a family, ruining a career or shutting down a business. In desperation, we reach sometimes toward the Lord Jesus, who bids us walk the rolling, churning tide toward Him.

Faith is the only life preserver guaranteed to work at a time like that. With it, we are provided the buoyancy needed to keep afloat as we defy every risk that would engulf and destroy us. As we approach the Master, how quickly He restores tranquility, confidence, vision — "peace that passeth understanding."

How many among us go with Him beside the still waters... the waters of the 23d Psalm and the New Testament? He restoreth my soul; he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness...

Noah was unable to enlist much assistance in building the ark, and nobody wanted to sail with him until after the swirling waters were rising. Then it was too late.

So often Christ bids us give our assistance in building the Kingdom of God, and to go to Him for salvation, healing, life everlasting. But the undertow of sin, temptation, lust, ambition, drags us helplessly far out to sea. In the raging tempest His quiet voice is sometimes lost. "Be of good cheer," he calls, but we perish in panic, unwilling to accept His offer of rescue.

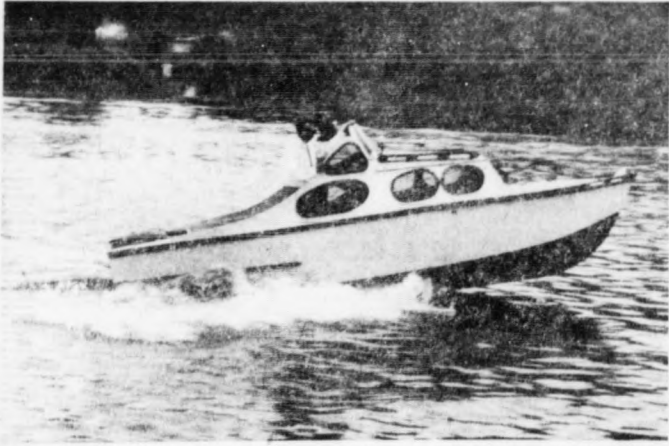

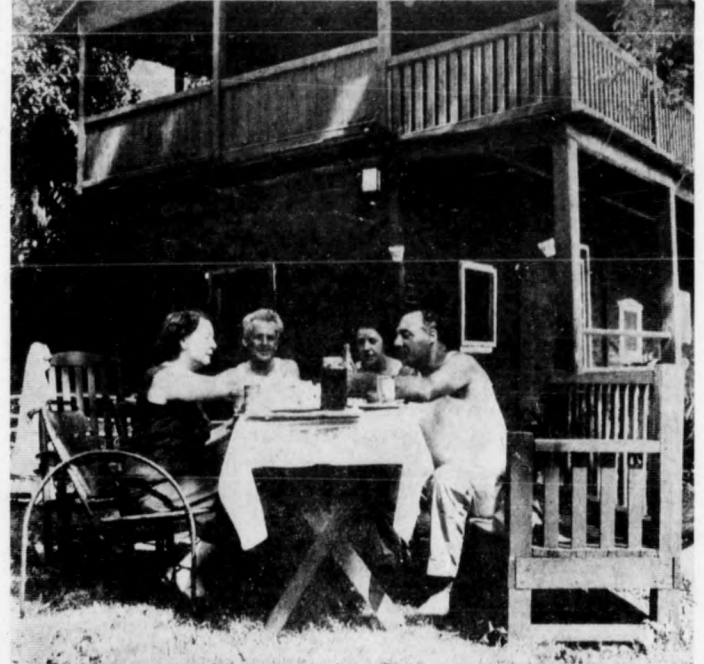
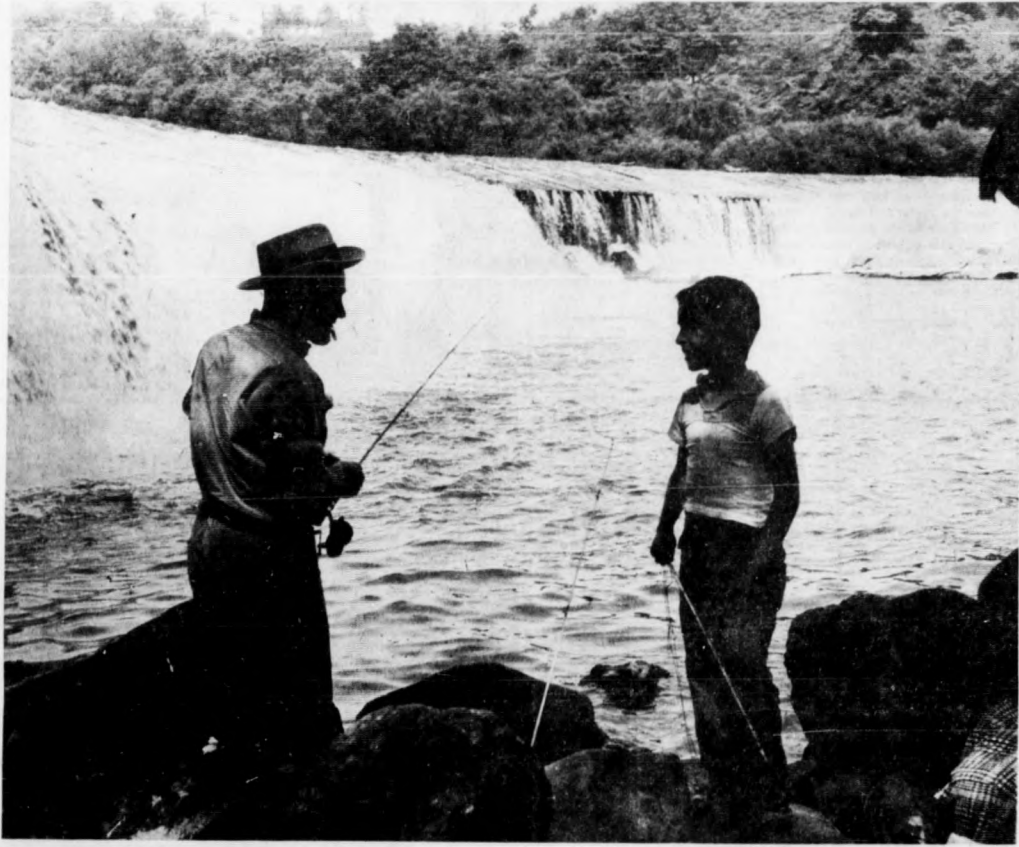

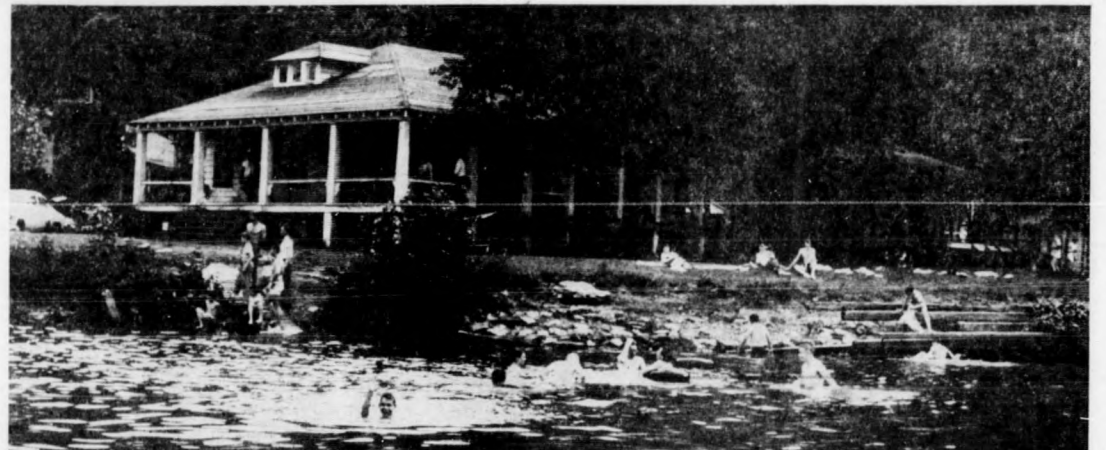

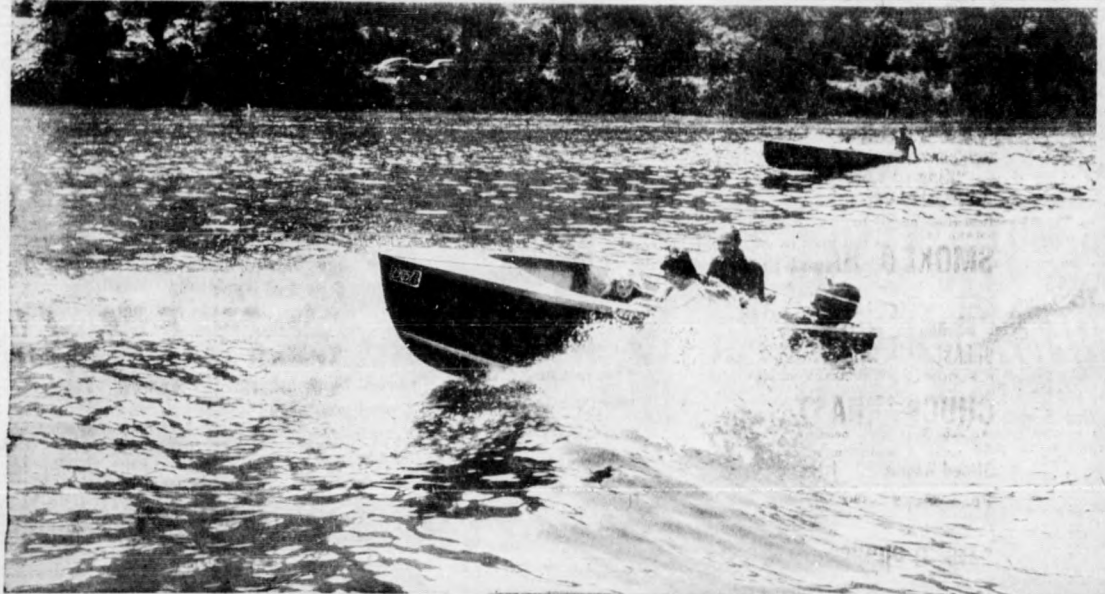

Bridge Work Contract Let

A contract has been let by the city Procurement Department to the Conduit and Foundation Corp. of Philadelphia for the erection of a new super-structure on the northbound City Line Ave. bridge over the Schuylkill River.

The contract calls for tearing down the present superstructure to the pier foundations and building a new superstructure of the plate girder type with a concrete deck.

The new structure will rise at its mid-point to a height approximately 70 feet above the water level.

Work on the northbound bridge is expected to get under way when the southbound bridge and its approaches, now under construction, are completed. The later job, a joint project of city and state, will probably be finished within two months. Completion of the northbound bridge will take a year.

During work on the northbound bridge a temporary ramp will be run from the bridge to the southbound one in order to accommodate traffic. Excavation and paving of approaches to the northbound bridge are also included in the contract.

Upper Merion Twp. Settled by Swedes

1500 Acres in Area Granted by William Penn In 1684 to Colonial Immigrants, Book Reveals

E. Gordon Alder, author of the volume, presents this account: As early as 1684 William Penn granted Peter Yocum (originally the Swedish name Joachim) 300 acres in this area. That same year Penn granted 1000 acres to Lasse Koll (Cox) & Co. Cox sold half of it in 1701 to a Swede named Gunnar Hambro. Before the middle of the 18th century five Hambros, one Yocum and three Holsten families were living in Upper Merion.

Settlements were also made during the 18th century in the Gulph Creek and King of Prussia areas, as well as along the Schuylkill north of Bridgeport and around Abrams. The name of the latter community is a reminder of the Abraham
