## Dr. Boehm Lauds School Boards Of 2 Districts

Plymouth Meeting — Dr. Charles H. Boehm, state superintendent of public instruction, commended the joint school boards of Plymouth and Whitemarsh townships for their role in making democracy work as he addressed the 113 members of the first graduating class of the joint high school Thursday night.

Dr. Boehm was the principal speaker at the commencement exercises attended by more than 2,000 relatives and friends of the young graduates.

Thomas Lee Shaeffer, honor student and one of the two class orators, received the \$1,000 C & D Baiteries scholarship in engineering which he will use to study at Cornell University.

Shaeffer led the list of prize winners, also picking up the Bausch and Lomb Science Award, G. W. Corson award in mathematics, Church and Community Club of Cold Point award in English and William Boulton Dixon award in mathematics.

Cardinal Brown, supervising principal who introduced the speaker, called him a man who has spent 20 years doing what other people talk about doing and labeled him the first man in education in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Boehm complimented the two graduate speakers, Shaeffer and Carole Ann Valjean, recalling early school days.

The state official lauded cooperation in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

# Commercial Zoning Problem Is Weighed By Plymouth Officials

Plymouth Center — Fearful that adequate control over development might not be retained under a commercial zoning classification, the board of commissioners of Plymouth township Monday night decided to reconsider a proposal of Fox brothers for an office building on Butler Pike at its July 9 session.

What was the position the board of education of Plymouth township took Tuesday night when it deferred final adoption of its 1956-57 budget until the new tax books are received from the county offices.

The Fox firm had applied for rezoning of a tract on Butler Pike between Plymouth consolidated school and Kears Lane to commercial to enable it to start the first of six proposed buildings costing an estimated \$250,000 each. Representatives of the development might serve as a medical center or offices as the need in the community grows.

Commissioners took the view, however, that to reclassify the property into a shopping center district might be more advisable. They agreed to readvertise the case for public hearing in July, including the land between the two parcels owned by Fox which contains six dwellings.

While members indicated satisfaction with the Fox proposals, there seemed to be concern that the plans might not be culminated as shown Monday and commercial zoning would turn the tract loose to other development.

# Resignation of Landis Shocks School Board; Secretary Also Quits

Conshohocken — Dr. Robert C. Landis submitted his sudden resignation of the public school district at the June meeting of the school board Thursday, still declining to give any reason for his action or to comment on the situation today.

Filling the post continuously for the last 30 years, the school official's resignation hit the community like a "bombshell."

He told a Recorder reporter, today, after lapse of almost a week since his formal resignation, that "there was no change in his decision."

Resigning at the same time was Miss Phyllis Jones, school district secretary for the same period served by Dr. Landis. She too, gave no reason for her decision and has made no further statement on the situation.

The dual resignations came like a cloudburst climax in an otherwise placid meeting. Dr. Erb termed it "stunning."

"I will entertain a motion to adjourn, unless there is any other new business," Dr. Russell C. Erb, president said with an inquiring look at 9:45.

"Yes," answered Dr. Landis, as he handed him a folded white paper without further comment.

Dr. Erb unfolded the note and read it to himself, as other members reverted to another matter discussed earlier.

"I have an unpleasant duty to perform," Dr. Erb said slowly, interrupting the discussion.

Once again, the board was just about to convene, when the second surprise came.

"Any other business," Dr. Erb inquired.

"Yes," said Miss Jones, as she also handed him a folded white paper.

# No Increase This Year in School Tax

Conshohocken Budget Totalling \$376,920 Officially Approved

Conshohocken — It was good news for heavily-burdened taxpayers at the June meeting of the school board, last Thursday night at the high school.

There will be no tax increase for the current year. The 1956-57 school district budget, totalling \$376,920, officially adopted at the session, is based on the current tax rate of 27 mills on property and \$10 per capita.

The tentative budget, adopted at the May meeting, reached an all-time high of \$420,270. As this figure was \$48,000 above the anticipated income based on the current tax rate, an increase in levy appeared inescapable if that budget were adopted.

In the 30 days on which the proposed budget was on required public display, board members decided to lop off almost \$50,000 by abandoning for the present plans for extensive renovations at the high school, recommended in a professional survey last year.

The new budget is \$8000 more than the current year, due mainly to voluntary and state-mandated increase in salary of personnel. An increase was allotted every district employee, except the superintendent and secretary.

Major expenditures are \$245,900 for salaries; \$46,300 for auxiliary salaries; \$32,250 for operation of the school plant; \$19,000 for maintenance; \$20,800 for fixed charges and \$2800 for debt service.

Her sister, Miss Frances N. Kasopsky, 51, who had a heart condition for five years, was found lifeless in her home, 228 W. Elm Ave., Tuesday morning. Pronounced dead by her physician, Dr. W. F. Ciesielski, the shock of her older sister's death is believed to have contributed to the fatal attack.

Solemn requiem mass for Mrs. Kozeniewski was offered this morning in St. Matthew's Church, where a similar service will take place for her sister, at 10 A. M. Saturday. They will be buried at St. Matthew's Cemetery.

# Defer Decision On Plymouth School Tax

Board of Education Waits for Figures From County Offices

Plymouth Meeting—No tax books. No tax rate. No budget.

That was the position the board of education of Plymouth township took Tuesday night when it deferred final adoption of its 1956-57 budget until the new tax books are received from the county offices.

Reassessment of real estate in the township this Spring and petitions for equalization caused the delay and directors decided they could not approve the budget until they know how much money they will need to fix the millage. Tentative tax figure is 33 mills.

Warren Isenberg, secretary, said he was informed the books should be ready in three weeks. The matter will come up again when the board meets July 2.

The board completed necessary details for the sale of \$150,000 of general obligation bonds for its share of financing construction of a million dollar addition to Plymouth-Whitemarsh High School.

Most of the meeting was occupied with explanation of the technicalities.

It authorized taking bids on several Summer repair jobs to school buildings in the district, fixing the opening date for the July session.

On the recommendation of Mrs. Edna Smith, chairman of the personnel committee, new teachers were appointed to the staff for September.

Approval of the concert has been given by the borough recreation council and the fire company. Date will be announced soon.

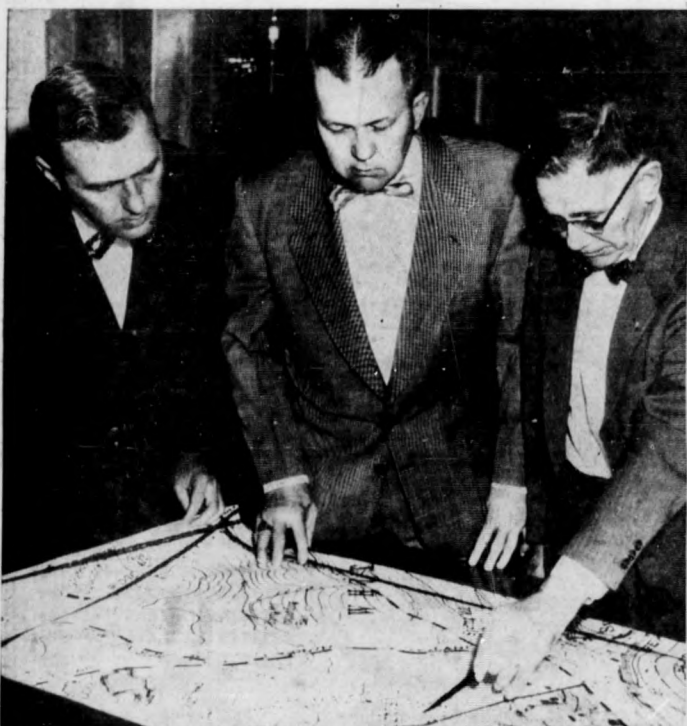

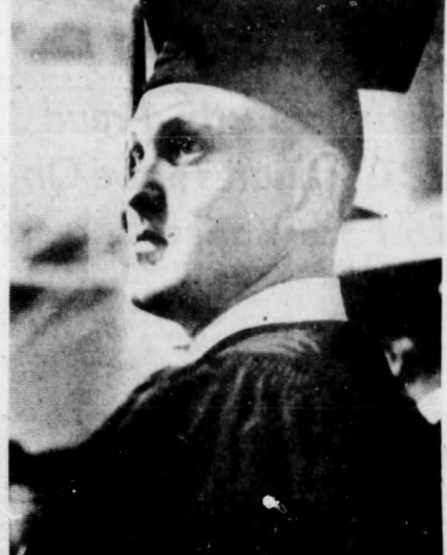

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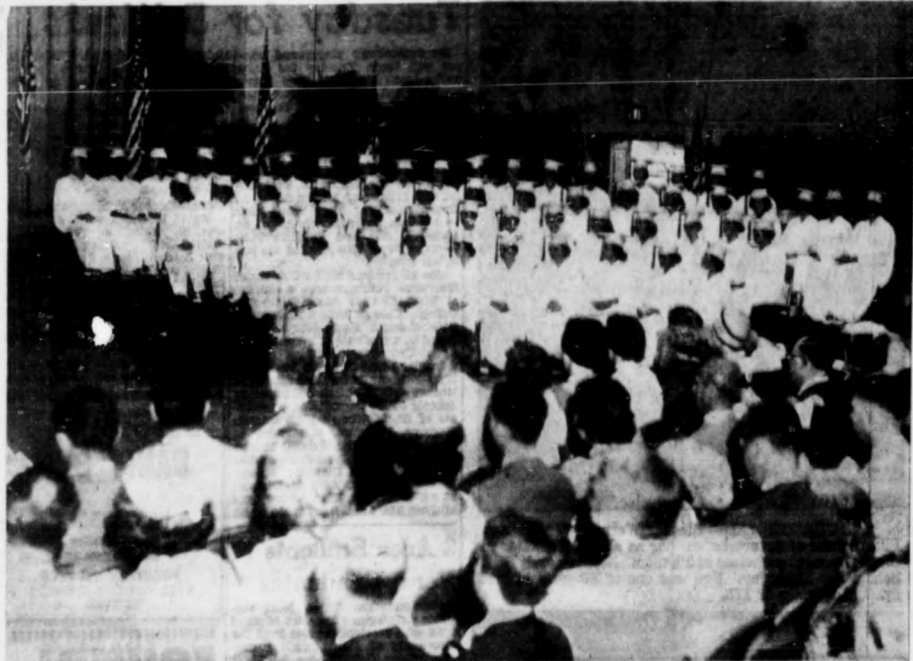

ative parents, citing the need for them, and saying that a great many parents in the last 25 years have given good teachers to the schools.

Only a few school systems are outstanding, Dr. Boehm declared. Many are good, poor or fair and there's a big difference between the good and the poor.

Schools often depend on one person for being good, poor or outstanding, he said, and too much emphasis is placed on money and bigness.

He cited the advantages of a well-informed school board and congratulated the Plymouth-Whitemarsh directors for their awareness.

"Our school board has made democracy work," Dr. Boehm asserted. "They have helped to perpetuate the American way of life. High on the list will be the names of the school directors who have made this institution possible."

How long is the cord on your telephone? No far measuring now! If you're like the rest of us, you don't really know.

A district manager for Southern Bell reports a psychologist at Bell telephone laboratories got to thinking about this one day and started an experiment to prove that the length of a telephone cord is just one of those things we take for granted.

A group of his fellow-scientists were innocent guinea pigs. Each evening after everybody went home, he had their telephone cords shortened one inch. Nothing was said. Ten days and ten inches of cord went by before someone noticed the cord growing shorter. But a sharp-eyed fellow was let in on the experiment and asked not to tell.

Many weeks later, all but one in the group had noticed the dwindling cords. The last man was making telephone calls with a four-inch cord when he commented that something had happened to his telephone.

If you haven't already measured your telephone cord, don't bother. It's 48 inches in Florida. And the telephone company strongly recommends against repeating the experiment on your friends.

It is the duty of the assessor to prepare a list of residents or inhabitants of the Township of Upper Merion over twenty-one years of age in order that the Board of School Directors may assess, levy and collect a per capita tax.

The Act of Assembly No. 193, June 30, 1951, P.L. 962, Section 1-b, provides as follows: "Every resident or inhabitant in any School District, upon attaining twenty-one years of age, and every person twenty-one years of age or over becoming a resident or inhabitant in any School District, shall, within twelve months after the happening thereof, notify the proper assessors of his becoming of age or becoming a resident or inhabitant. ## Health Warning Against Ticks

Conshohocken—An urgent warning against ticks is issued today by Clarence H. Cooper, health officer. Cooper, speaking for the board of health, says the small dangerous tick-borne insects are not only prevalent within the borough but sometimes invade offices and homes.

He urges that parents waste no time in thoroughly examining children who have been playing in fields of wooded areas. Within two hours, the tiny parasites may cause a serious infection known as Rocky Mountain spotted fever, usually fatal, if they are not removed from the skin surface when they imbued themselves. He urged adults to take the same precautions if exposed to any conditions that might harbor the treacherous mites.

Cooper also urged necessity of keeping garbage cans and refuse containers covered at all times, to prevent flies, as a precaution against poen.
