

Enroll Now Derby Lists Open

Boys ranging in ages from 11 to 15 years start enrolling today for competition in the sixth annual Soap Box Derby to be held July 4 on Fayette St. between Eighth Ave. and Fifth Ave., Conshohocken.

Contestants enroll at the E. F. Moore Chevrolet agency, 12th Ave. and Fayette St. E. F. Moore Jr., The Conshohocken Recorder and The Valley Forge Sentinel sponsor the annual event and take the champion to Akron, O., by plane for participation in the world's greatest amateur race for boys. The 1957 Derby will be the 20th at Akron and will take place Aug. 18.

Eddie Moore will be at his showrooms tonight, tomorrow and Saturday to personally welcome boys who are eager to register and discuss details with their parents. Registration will continue until at least 50 boys have been enrolled.

Outstanding attraction of the year locally, the derby is always a check full of excitement. For next Independence Day many new plans are under way. Moore disclosed at a meeting Tuesday night at the Fellowship House. The committee already has gone about collecting valuable prizes, signing up sponsors and obtaining the names of individuals and organizations interested in having part in promotion of the derby.

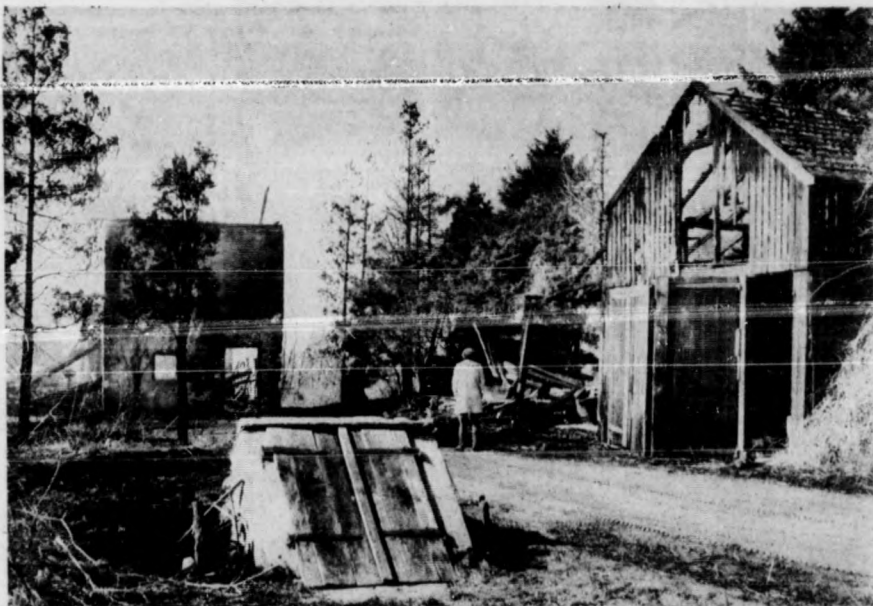

Ground to Be Broken Mar. 20 for \$150,000 Steelworkers' Building

A modern \$150,000 headquarters will soon be built by Local 1392, United Steelworkers CIO-AFL in Plymouth township.

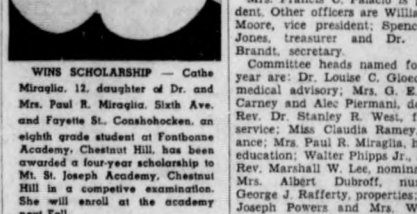
Ground will be broken for the one-story structure at noon Wednesday on Ridge Pike, west of Alan Wood Rd., Seven Stars.

Harleton R. Wood, head of Alan Wood Steel Co., Ivy Rock, which the Local is affiliated, and Paul Wood, industrial relations director, area city officials and a Union international representative from Pittsburgh will be present.

Known as the David J. MacDonald Labor Lyceum, it will honor the head of the International Steelworkers-Union.

First headquarters erected by the Local, comprising 2500 employees of the steel firm, it is the first project of its kind in District 7, United Steelworkers, comprising large areas of Penna., New Jersey and Delaware.

Completion of the building, 92 feet wide and 150 feet deep, is expected by next Sept. Formal dedication is planned for October.

Traffic Light Plans Changed Again by State

The long-sought traffic light at 11th Ave. and Fayette St. ran into another road block last night.

All set to place the order for the signal, Conshohocken Borough Council, faced with a change in plans necessary to meet the State's approval, ordered that the bid for the new signal be returned unopened.

The State had approved the "remote control" signal, the type now in use on Fayette St. below 11th, Peter Brunl told, but the drawings and specifications provided by the State Highway Dept. are for the activator or detector type of light.

This type, costing almost \$2,000 more than the other, would not answer borough needs, councilmen said.

"I don't know who makes the traffic regulations in Harrisburg," said Harold Best, street committee chairman, "but they certainly missed the boat as far as human lives are concerned. An activator light is wasted money for us."

Brunl said a state survey showed that 92 percent of traffic at the 11th Ave. intersection of the main street runs on Fayette and eight percent on 11th Ave.

Barn Destroyed by Fire Valuable Trees Saved At Andorra Nurseries

Ridge Pike Blaze Causes Traffic Delay

Alertness of Sgt. Charles Young, of Whitmarsh township police and prompt response of volunteer firemen last night saved the destruction of an historic dwelling on Ridge Pike, opposite Green Valley Country Club.

Sparks from a huge barn engulfed in flames ignited the roof of the house, vacant for several years, and two outbuildings.

Sgt. Young, patrolling at the time, summoned fire companies through the police radio in his car. Spring Hill, Barren Hill, Lincoln and Harmonville responded. Barren Hill remaining on the scene from 8 P. M. until 1:32 A. M. today.

The barn, owned by Andorra Nurseries Inc., and the outbuildings were destroyed. Firemen prevented flames from spreading to valuable evergreens in adjoining fields.

Damage was estimated at \$2000. A mechanized hay rake, cultivator and corn harvesting machine were destroyed.

Edgar E. Mitchell, chief of police, said the department had chased boys from the barn on numerous occasions. He suspected one of them may have set fire to the building.

Hundreds of automobiles lined the highways during the blaze. Officer George Thompson, of Whitmarsh police, directed traffic off of Ridge Pike at Joshua Rd., detouring motorists to Germantown Pike and Spring Hill. At Spring Hill Rd. and Ridge Pike traffic also was detoured.

A surprise birthday party was held March 4 to pay tribute to a man who was donating his 64th and last pint of blood.

Joseph M. Renton, 8601 Tiona St., Andorra, administrative assistant, technical division, Naval Aviation supply office, was merely going through a ritual he had been doing many years — donating a pint of blood during the American Red Cross Bloodmobile visit.

It seemed routine to him that he should be the first donor during the four-day visit — so routine he had nearly lost count of the number of times he gave.

His fellow employees had not forgotten, however, and neither had the American Red Cross. There to surprise him were a host of his closest friends, a huge birthday cake with lighter candles which formed the figure 64 — for his age, RADM J. W. Crumpecker, commanding officer, Aviation Supply Office and Naval Aviation supply depot, to present him the Red Cross pin to signify the eight gallons of blood he had donated; a huge sign bearing the words "Happy Birthday Joe," and a chorus of voices loudly chanting "happy birthday to you."

Renton thanked everyone and checked through the donor line on his last trip. Red Cross rules say once you're 60 years old, you're ineligible to donate blood.

Joe wasn't 60 until noon.

Other rules stipulate that a donor must wait eight weeks before giving again and Joe also slipped under the wire on that point. He had volunteered the day after Christmas when the Red Cross advertised an acute shortage of blood.

Like the Pied Piper of Hamelin, Joe led a group of friends through the donor line into the room where Red Cross attendants accepted his final donation.

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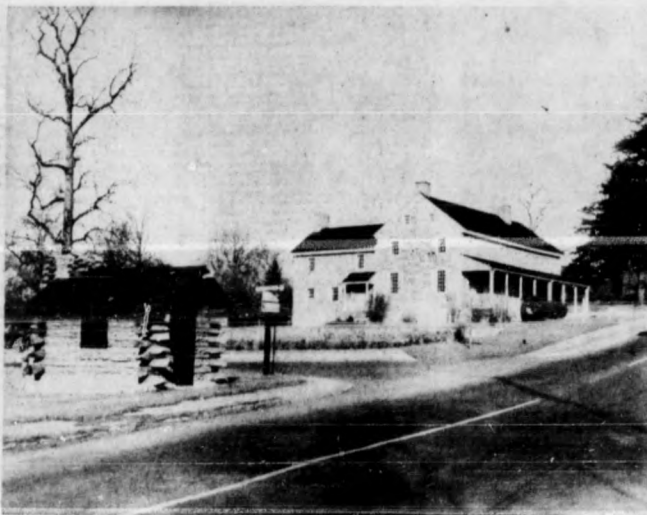

Flash only when traffic turned in or out 11th Ave. Special equipment would permit pedestrians, children included, to activate the signal.

The discussion charged that the State "failed to consider the pedestrian angle or the children" in its choice of lights. Many children would use the crossing because of the new St. Matthew's High School at 14th Ave. and Forrest St. and because of the proximity of the community athletic field at 11th Ave. and Harry St.

"Sometimes four and five thousand persons use that crossing when there is a football game," Edward O'Brien, fire ward, said.

"I'd rather see nothing there than a light we don't want," said Burns.

It was mentioned that Montgomery County Boroughs Association already is working for legislation to empower boroughs to install their own traffic signals without State interference.

Result of the long discussion was a decision to have a delegation from council meet with the State Highway Dept. to appeal once more for a signal similar to the others on Fayette St.

Frank Zadrozka objected to the State's replacing an earlier 15 to 25 mile speed limit on Fayette St. with a 35 mile speed limit.

He said it was dangerous for school children and asked that Council appeal to the State to restore the lower speed limit.

"What's the use of traffic lights if they go through the town at 35 miles?" he asked.

Burns reported the long-planned traffic "improvement program" is underway.

He said a delayed-action warning light has been installed at Elm and Fayette St.

Rental of an automobile as a second car for the police department, instead of purchase of one, was recommended by John P. O'Connor, in his report as property chairman.

Burns said that rental would save the borough an estimated \$700 per year.

He said the borough spent \$3400 for police transportation last year. On the rental basis, a car would cost only \$1680 per year, including gas, oil, garage and repairs. Average use of a police car is 3,000 miles per month.

The suggestion met with favor from councilmen except James Bestmeyer, with commendations by Zadrozka and Burns for Burns' research. The matter was referred to the finance and property committees and solicitor.

The 1957 budget of 215,402.53, an all-time high, tentatively adopted at the February meeting, was given final approval.

Providing a five percent increase to police department and borough office personnel and other varying wage increases, it is based on a continued tax rate of 18 mills, property and \$5 per capita.
