Oaks Is Site Of \$2,000,000 Penco Plant

Operations to Start In July at Division Of Alan Wood Co.

Work on the new plant of Penco Metal Products, now under construction at Oaks, is progressing rapidly and operations at the new location will get underway in early July this year. Penco Metal Products is a division of Alan Wood Steel Company of Conshohocken.

J. Bremner Proctor, general manager of Penco, stated that the new plant, to cost more than \$2,000,000 and contain 154,000 square feet of conditioned office and manufacturing space, will be the most modern in the industry, and will be equipped to produce three to four times the number of high quality steel lockers, cabinets and shelving now produced at the Division's Philadelphia plant.

Manufacturing equipment now on order and to be installed at Oaks will be the finest of its kind in the industry. Penco will also install the latest type of painting equipment, using the electrostatic method. Other modern manufacturing equipment now in operation at the Philadelphia plant will be transferred to Oaks.

An outstanding feature of the Oaks plant will be an extensive dehumidified area for the storage of fabricated but unpainted stock parts. This system, which is unique, will reduce the processing time between entry of order and shipment," Proctor stated.

The new plant, about ten miles up the Schuylkill River from the main facilities of Alan Wood Steel at Conshohocken, will be a one-story structure of concrete and steel construction, with prefabricated steel siding on all exterior walls. Its strategic location at Oaks makes it readily accessible to through roads and express highways for rapid motor truck movement of supplies and finished products. The plant will also be served by main truck line roads.

Penco Metal Products traces its history back to 1889, making it one of the earliest producers of quality lockers, cabinets and shelving in the country. Penco products are found in schools, gymnasiums, factories, courts, clubs, commercial establishments and practically every place where equipment of this kind is used.

Death Corner Road Change Plans Ready

The re-location of Chemical Rd. and the elimination of two crests on Germantown Pike at the dangerous intersection are soon to be undertaken by the Pennsylvania Department of Highways.

This was reported to Plymouth township officials yesterday by S. C. Weikert, acting highway department district engineer, who said that the plans are awaiting approval.

The township authorities long have sought elimination of the dangerous intersection, where three young Air Force men, all residents of Conshohocken, lost their lives last October.

Traffic on Chemical Rd. would be re-routed from the Lavino plant to a location on Ridge Pike at North lane. This would mean the elimination of the dangerous intersection where Chemical Rd. traffic now enters the Ridge.

The intersection is now guarded by warning signs, posted on Germantown Pike. For months, Plymouth officials have sought aid from the State and county to erect a traffic light at the intersection.

Parking Lot Plan Boosted By Merchants

44 Attend Session Sponsored by C. Y. C.; Rafferty Chairman

First steps toward a public parking lot in the lower business section of Conshohocken were taken Monday night at the Park House.

Forty-four men and women merchants, property owners and occupants of properties on the lower part of Fayette St., answered the Chamber of Commerce's invitation for a public discussion of the proposed lot.

George J. Rafferty, chairman of the traffic committee, retail division of the Chamber of Commerce, was named chairman of a group to make a study of parking lot sites and procure plans. Another meeting is to be called as soon as this preliminary work is done.

Only site yet considered includes three abutting properties, an area 74 by 210 feet, the Dugan news agency, the former Fogarty grocery and the James P. Meany property, located just below the former bank at Fayette and Hector streets.

Conshohocken Town Council has frequently discussed a municipal parking lot, to ease traffic conditions and attract more shoppers, but no action has been taken. Councilman James Desimone is an advocate of such a lot.

Plymouth-Whitemarsh Sets Scholastic Rating

The Plymouth-Whitemarsh Scholastic Rating Committee, Germantown Pike east of Butler Pike, Plymouth Meeting, is "well above the average in instructional program."

This was the result announced from a test of the student body last fall, the Plymouth-Whitemarsh Joint School Board was told Thursday night.

Six women teachers for the school's new million-dollar-plus addition, opening next fall, were engaged and resignation of the defunct received at the nearly five-hour session.

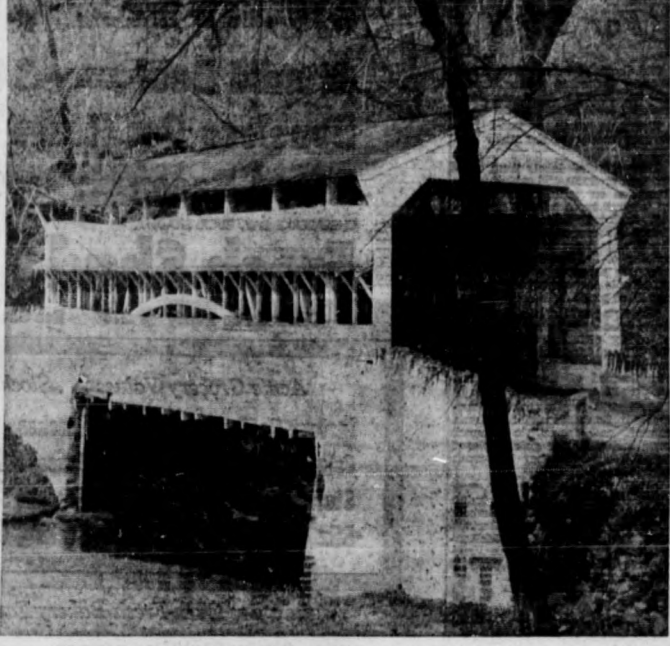

Actual order to remove the "schoolgirl" or "the highway department would do," and consign them to the junk pile, came to Chief Mitchell from Robert D. Fisher, district highway superintendent at Norristown.

Fisher later said that the order originated at the five-county district headquarters at Haverford. He said that one of the Haverford staff noticed the schoolgirl silent policemen while passing through the township and reported it to an official.

The Haverford office notified the Norristown district. Chief Mitchell demanded orders in writing from Fisher, got them and obeyed them under protest, filing vigorous objection with the department. Resultant publicity brought wide response and the reversal in the state highway department's attitude.

Michael J. Laputka, township secretary-treasurer said "dozens of telephone calls" had come in from many parts of the State and out of state about the enforced removal of the signs, depicting in color silhouette a small schoolgirl carrying books, with the message "School — 15 M. P. H."

"I have traveled thousands of miles — and frequently through your township," a West Coast motorist wrote Chief Mitchell, "I found those 'schoolgirl' warning signs most helpful in alerting me of schools in the vicinity."

The Lions Club of Frackville, reading of the State's directive about the "girls," telephoned Chief Mitchell to "hold on to them."

"We'd like to buy those signs," a club official said. "We'll set them up on our streets where schools are if the State won't let us put them on their highways."

John N. Pomeroy, Assemblyman from the Chestnut Hill area, also was quick to come to the aid of the spurned "schoolgirls."

"Don't destroy them," Pomeroy said. "If we can't get some better legislation out of Harrisburg, I'll work for a bill to make them legal."
