coming, would certainly not be applicable to those Districts who had started building before the law was passed.

"Quite a disturbing factor has come into the picture at the time of the June 1957 meeting concerning the fact that there is contemplated a 6 mill school tax rise due to the miscalculation of someone or some group on the local level in the operation of our school system. This contemplated 6 mill rise together with a very minimum of an additional 19 mills for the new elementary school would make for a 16 mill rise in the school tax rate over and above the present rate which would seem to be most burdensome to the taxpayers.

"The present tax rate is 27 mills; added to this the 16 mills it would make for at least a 43 mill tax rate. This, it would seem, is quite an increase. In fact, it would be over a 50% increase in the tax rate."

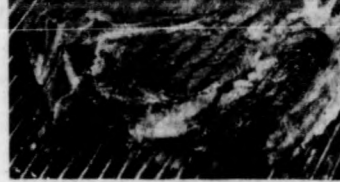

Alarming Report!
Death Stalks 39 On County Highways

Deaths from motor vehicle accidents increased alarmingly in Montgomery County during the first six months of 1957, according to a summary compiled by the office of Coroner John C. Simpson, Court House, Norristown.
For the period there were 39 deaths listed as compared to 26 for the same period in 1956.
Of the 1957 deaths, 21 involved operators, and nine each, passengers and pedestrians.
Thirty-two of the fatalities resulted from accidents in the county. There were seven deaths listed in county hospitals in which the accidents occurred in other counties.
Lower Providence listed five deaths: Lower Gwynedd, four; Abington and Whitemarsh, three each; Limerick and Lower Merion, two each; Cheltenham, Hatfield Tap, Lower Moreland, Montgomery, Plymouth, Upper Dublin, Upper Merion, Upper Providence, Collegedale, Conshohocken, Pottstown, Schuylkill and Telford, one each.
The out-of-county accidents included three in Delaware, two in Chester and one each in Bucks and Philadelphia.
The coroner's office investigated 236 cases during the past six months. Of this number, 131 were for natural causes; 39 motor vehicle accidents; 19 suicides; two homicides, and 44 other accidents.
Among the other accidents were 13 institution falls; 9 home falls; 7 drownings; 5 industrial; 3 overdose of pills; one each of carbon monoxide, fall in store, fall on ice, fall from train, fall from ladder, suffocation and airplane.
For the first six months of 1956 there were 27 suicides and 56 other accidents.

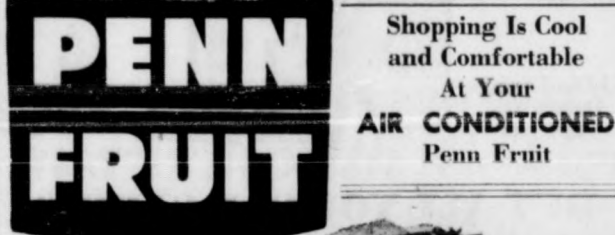
