

## Local Tax Dollar in For Fight

School Directors, Borough Council Argue on Sharing It

A "tax war" is in the making in Conshohocken between the school board and borough council. And the war is expected to go beyond the tax ramprats if councilmen have their way.

The first live ammunition was fired last night when the school board informed a session of council it intended to take its share of the one percent real estate transfer tax next year. Council earlier in the year caught the school board sentinels sleeping by passing the transfer tax retroactive to Jan. 1.

This precluded the board from taking its bite of an estimated \$7,000 kitty for the year. Thus, the shot heard round the town.

Council strategists figure the school board pulled a flanking maneuver by issuing its ultimatum to take its share. But both sides have yet begun to fight.

Dr. Russell C. Erb, school board president, issued a communique at a meeting of the board Monday to the effect the board will undertake another campaign that already has councilmen shaking in their boots.

This is a counter-offensive to bring about a re-assessment of borough property values on their own in retaliation for council's re-

## \$200 Earn \$183,000 in Dividends

Conshohocken Federal Increase Is Gratifying

## W. Fifth Ave. Traffic To Be One Way at Bank Parking Lot Entrance

A traffic bottleneck at Fifth Ave. and Fayette St. during peak banking hours on Fridays apparently is solved, Borough Council last night voted to make W. Fifth Ave. leading to the drive-in windows of the Philadelphia National Bank a one-way street.

The avenue will be one-way going East from Forrest St. to Fayette St. Motorists who use the bank's drive-in windows to make deposits and cash checks now cause the bottleneck when they turn off Fayette into W. Fifth Ave.

Three other streets are slated for one-way designation. They are W. First Ave. West from Fayette to Maple St.; Robinson's Alley North from W. Hector to W. First Ave. and E. 12th Ave. from Jones St. to Righter St.

Francis Kelly, chairman of the public safety committee, submitted the recommendations. An ordinance will be drawn up incorporating the provisions.

Doctors, undertakers, visiting nurses and firemen on special duty were granted the privilege of buying parking meter covers (canvas bags) "as a courtesy of the borough."

## Alan Moore Heads County Department New Office Is Consolidation of Three Allied Units

County Commissioners Hammond, Cornell and Henry, at a weekly meeting Tuesday, created a Department of County Records, consolidating the archives, microfilm and bookbinding units.

J. Alan Moore, of Conshohocken, a veteran county employee who was the original head of the microfilming office, was named supervisor of the new department, effective immediately. Moore's salary will be set at a meeting of the Salary Board.

At the same time, the commissioners adopted a resolution abolishing the former units, transferring the separate budgets into a single account.

The county archives, which contain old records from all Court House offices, is located in the basement of the annex. For many years it has been supervised by a commissioner's clerk.

The bookbinding department, also in the court house basement, is being operated by two clerks who repair books and do all mimeographing for the county.

In the microfilming headquarters, Moore supervised a staff that, through delicate photographic machinery, transfers certain county records to film for a permanent record.

The commissioners also approved a request of the Planning Commission, awarding a \$1,500 contract to the Sanborn Map Co., of Pelham, N. Y. for the purpose of doing a planning study of the borough of Telford.

Conshohocken soon will have another police officer. Burgess James (Pat) Mellon appealed to borough council for an additional man in the face of a shortage of officers.

Burgess Mellon said Officer Samuel Cardamone was stricken ill and will be out for an indefinite period. Other officers have started vacation periods which will leave the borough with a pre-arrangement.

Officer Cardamone was stricken ill Monday evening shortly after he reported for duty at borough hall at 4 Joseph P. Thomas, borough inspector, drove the officer home. Later, he was admitted to Sacred Heart Hospital. His wife said he would remain in the hospital through the week for a general medical checkup.

The Conshohocken Borough Council last night dealt a "body blow" to Chief of Police Walter Phipps by voting 7-6 for his forced retirement as of Tuesday. At the same time, the majority ostensibly acted in his best interest by "granting" a \$200-a month pension.

A pension plan passed last winter provides that an officer with 20 years' service who has reached age 60 "may" retire if he so wishes. Council voted, on recommendation of Peter Bruni, chairman of the police pension fund committee,

just to even think about an operation of such task force size.

Dr. Erb said the board must fight alone. "We will take steps to get a re-assessment without council's cooperation," he added. It is expected the board will appeal to the county board of assessment and revision of taxes for aid in getting the thing launched.

Council figures discretion is the better part of valor when the re-assessment bomb is dropped. They will under fire, fearful of the wrath of taxpayers, who they insist "blame council for all the borough's troubles."

Several councilmen may be elated for gallantry in action, however. They bravely went on record as favoring a re-assessment when a vote was taken at a previous meeting.

Joseph Burns, president of council, rebuked Dr. Erb indirectly. "One member of the school board has done a very discourteous service to council by saying we are going to leave the school board holding the bag on re-assessment. No communication has been received on it from the school board."

Borough firemen were brought into the milieu when it was pointed out the transfer tax was enacted to aid the borough fire companies, although not specifically stated in the ordinance. This provision would make the ordinance illegal.

Issue also was taken by council with "men of means" who can afford to pay high taxes. This higher echelon, a councilman opined, "looks to outlying sections where professional and middle class people of substance live in new developments. The people of Conshohocken are not of equal earning power as these."

James Desimone, fiery councilman who believes in the war strategy of "attack, always attack," demanded council "do something" to stop the school board.

"Let's direct the solicitor to find if we can make this a court case," Desimone shouted. "There must be some way to stop them." He implored the group to direct an investigation.

Attorney Francis Dennis, borough solicitor rose to his feet and stated dramatically:

"The only recourse is to apply to the Court of Public Opinion - apply to your newspaper!"

Councilman Philip Gravinese, although he felt the board's plan to take half of the transfer tax was unfair, leaned toward appeasement. He urged the council and board to arrange a conference.

"If we throw fire at them," he said, "they will throw fire back at us."

Donald Moore, newcomer to council, felt an "ally" would solve the problem. He suggested a merger of West Conshohocken school district, now in financial stress, with Conshohocken.

"Why not try a merger," Moore asked. "West Conshohocken could save \$60,000 a year. In addition, the children would be picked up and returned in buses, out of the weather; they would have a new school and many other advantages."

The sum up in the tax war was given for council by another fighter for action, Peter Bruni.

"I went on record to have council oppose this new school," Bruni said, "so the public would be informed it is not council that is saddling this town with debt."

Meanwhile, the school board is readying its big guns for a battle it realizes will not be easy to win.

**Mental Test Ordered for Carl Blessing**

Admitted Rapist Sent to Hospital For 90-Day Period

A 22-year-old Lafayette Hill man, who admitted to attacking two women, was described by authorities as "coming from a good family and neighborhood."

Carl Blessing Jr., of the 4000 block of Woodruff Rd., pleaded guilty last Wednesday before Judge Louis Levinthal in Philadelphia to the attack on a 27-year-old Olney mother last Feb. 25 and the attack on a chambermaid in a midcity hotel May 16.

Blessing formerly lived in Roxborough on Wendover St. near Henry Ave. He was an accomplished musician, playing saxophone in his own local band before entering the Navy for a three-year tour of duty. He was discharged about a year ago.

Blessing was sent to Philadelphia General Hospital for a 90-day period to undergo psychiatric examination. The State wants the Barr-Walker Act which provides a one-day to life sentence in morals cases, enforced. The act is designed to keep sex deviates permanently confined unless they are shown to have been cured of their mental illness. The act, passed seven years ago, has been used only 38 times.

Judge Levinthal first ordered a psychiatric examination, but Dr. Sherman F. Gilbert, state psychiatrist, said more time would be needed for the tests. After the 90-day confinement at the hospital, Blessing will be sentenced.

While debate ensued over the amendment, several councilmen among those favoring the new cause indicated that a 60 to 90 day notice would be the noble thing to do. However, after Frank Zadroga left the room in a huff over the apparent course of proceedings, another vote was taken.

This was on a motion by Kelly, seconded by Bruni, that Chief Phipps be notified of his retirement effective July 15 (Tuesday), just five days' notice. Chief Phipps, who was 60 in March, also was "granted" three weeks' vacation to which he is entitled.

The vote was the same as on the amending clause, except that Zadroga was absent.

The amendment, which will be drawn up by Attorney Francis Dennis, borough solicitor, must be passed on three readings. State code permits two readings in one session of council and the third at the next regular meeting before an ordinance may become law. The council may, however, have it read once at three successive meetings.

This could mean the amending clause would not become law for 90 days. General practice is to pass two readings at one session and the third at the next—this meaning a 60-day wait.

Attorney Dennis, who was called upon nearly a dozen times for legal opinion, engaged in a brief debate with Councilman Desimone. Desimone said, "Mr. Solicitor, I understand you are supposed to be impartial, but you keep saying council 'has' the right to do this and that."

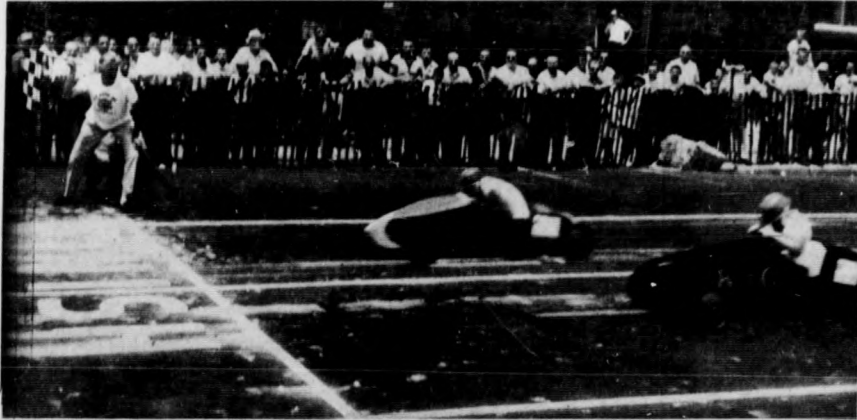
