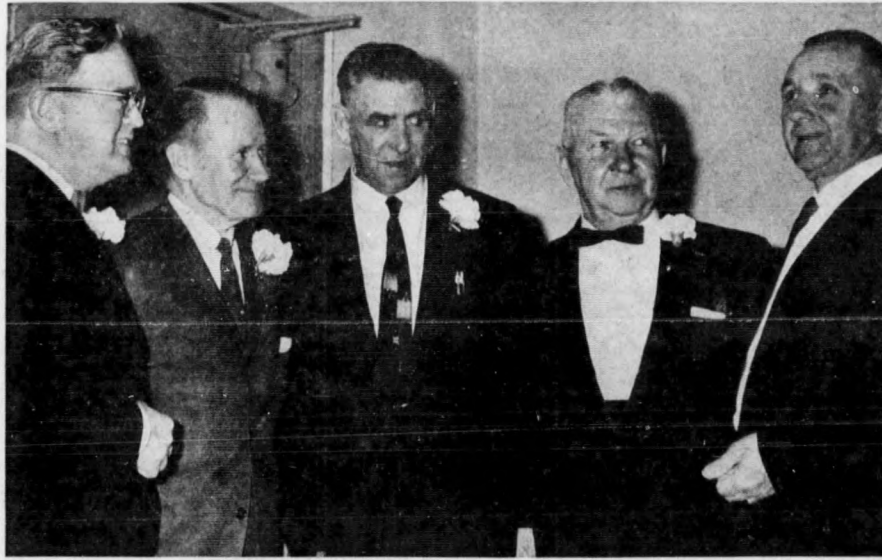

Firing Line At Banquet In Fire Hall

DR. HENRY OLSZTA, having ceased on Monday to be a candidate for Burgess of Conshohocken, is in an enviable position—each of the two men determined to fight it out at the primary May 16 on the Republican ticket is eager to have him as campaign manager but the head of the Board of Health hasn't decided yet whether he will accept either offer.

Former Councilman **Charles Slavin**, one of the town's oldest residents, is going to work for a Republican victory and it looks like he will go along with the original thinking of the committeemen and women in endorsing **Francis Ruggiero**, justice of the peace here for 11 years. Born and reared in Conshohocken, Ruggiero entered the race for Burgess by an 8 to 6 vote of committeemen and women which has not been changed since a meeting held several weeks ago with Attorney **Walter "Woodie" Phipps** presiding. Endorsed are:

Borough Council, **Joseph Ryan**, Sixth Ward and **Robert Desimone**, Seventh Ward.

School Board, **George Snear**, incumbent and **Benjamin Hannum**.

Tax Collector, **William A. McMahon**, incumbent.

Justice of the Peace **Francis Bobenreith**, incumbent.

There is one happy man in Conshohocken today. After two burglaries at his establishment at Fayette and Marble Sts., on Feb. 23 and March 17, Stanley Marchak has begun to recover some of his stolen property, valued at \$1500.

At 7 Monday night, Chief **Charles J. Marwood** of the Conshohocken Police department was notified by Norristown's Chief of Police **Robert Baxter** that they had a lead to some stolen property and believed some of it had been taken in Conshohocken.

Chief Marwood and Sgt. **Raymond Alexander** began an intensive investigation, along with Officer **Peter Venera** that led to recovery of a portion of Marchak's property yesterday.

Arrested were a trio of Montgomery Countians: **Harry Wilson**, 50, of E. Elm St., Norristown; **Kenneth Jones**, 44, of W. Fifth St., Bridgetown; and **Charles Alexander MacDougall Jr.**, 40, of E. Elm St., Norristown.

MacDougall, well-known by Conshohocken police for previous minor infractions, was apprehended in a Norristown store where he was selling some "merchandise." The so-called merchandise happened to be some of the Marchak loot. All items sold were later identified by Marchak. At the bar, MacDougall was picked up having a couple of lamps in his possession.

Don't Yield to Instinct To Make Life Easier For Next Generation

"Don't take struggle out of the lives of your children—
"Don't yield to the instinct to

make life easier for my boy than it was for me."

This was the gist of an address by **Dr. G. Sieber Pancoast**, professor of Political Science and baseball coach at Ursinus College, Collegeville, at an all sports banquet Monday night in the cafeteria of Plymouth-Whitemarsh High School.

Dr. Pancoast said of "W":
"You are a young school and already you have assumed your place among 1 ders. This accomplishment belies the dire statements of some educators today that youth is drifting, afraid and without purpose. Your performance in interscholastic sports gives evidence of exactly the opposite of direction, courage and purpose.

He said sports will keep one physically fit, substitute fun for political fighting and preserve the American spirit.

"Should one go so far as to participate in combat sports? Hear what the Journal of the American Medical Association has said editorially: "Medicine does not discourage activity, sports, competition or even a reasonable risk of injury. Medicine recognizes that a fractured ankle may leave less of a scar than a personality frustrated by parental timidity over participation in contact sports."

"Good grades accompany good physical fitness."

"The John Dewey philosophy in education, covetous and doing parents, the desire for security rather than opportunity, from each according to his ability to each according to his needs—all these, and there are others, are examples of the way we are taking the fight, and enjoyment, out of life.

"Don't rob your children of struggle. The instinct of fathers and mothers is to do just that — to make life 'easier' for my boy than (Continued on Page Four)

Upper Merion Police believe the group is involved in a burglary at Valley Forge Shopping Center also. At an earlier hearing, Deery refuted a statement which had implicated the others in the burglaries.

Here was the climax to a series of events that were the best things that ever happened to mankind. Here the fitting windup to the Divine Plan introduced 33 years earlier at Bethlehem.

"I am the resurrection and the life . . ." Herod was vanquished! Hitler was vanquished! Communism was vanquished! His kingdom endureth forever.

A Grain Of Salt

AS THE FIRST 60 days of the Kennedy Administration came to a close on Monday, simultaneously, the President's two-month honeymoon with Republican members of Congress came to a crashing halt. The wonder was that it had lasted so long.

CHESTNUT HILL'S OWN SENATOR Hugh D. Scott, who just has been the spokesman for the Republican Party, rent asunder the domestic tranquility that has marked Washington D. C. since Jan. 20 in Fort Worth, Texas.

"AN ERA OF GOOD FOOLING" is being enjoyed by Kennedy, Scott quipped. . . . The President plays a good game of golf, but he plays an even better game of politics and the Kennedy Administration is manning every single barricade with the politically shrewd and the politically deservant," Scott charged.

COINCIDING WITH Scott's blast was the germ of doubt which already had crept into the minds of thousands of the "Thinking Americans" who had voted for the New Frontier candidate. "Thinking Americans are those who seriously considered every issue and debated them fully before voting. This excludes those who, like sheep, blindly followed the party line, regardless of issue."

THE THINKING AMERICANS, who had shrugged off Kennedy's nepotism (brother Bobby for attorney general) and overlooked most of the obvious minor patronage appointments were more than a little shocked when Kennedy blatantly named admitted segregationist and racist Charles L. Meriwether, of Alabama to head the Export-Import Bank. This was in defiance to Kennedy's good friend Alabama Governor John Patterson, first southerner to go all out in backing Kennedy.

THE TRAGEDY in this out and out patronage was twofold. The dedicated, if naive, Kennedy supporters were disillusioned that their handsome, energetic Harvard-accented President had stooped to such an old political device while approaching the new frontier. And to Republicans, who have virtually bent over backwards in fighting legislation to win support of the Negro and Jewish votes, the appointment of a segregationist, to an Administration that was largely elected by the voting support of Negroes and Jews, was sardonic.

ALTHOUGH DISILLUSIONED and saddened at seeing their New Frontier bubble burst on the hard rocks of political reality, most Americans still have confidence that their President will overcome these first, faltering steps and go on to be one of our great leaders. We have no choice now but to wait and see. The prayers, the hopes and the dreams of all Americans are invested in President Kennedy. The thinking Americans trust they have chosen correctly.

The last of the 36 bells to be dedicated is the Rhode Island State Bell, donated in June, 1960.

The carillon at Valley Forge was the first large carillon in America, one bell having been given by each of the then 48 states. Later a National Birthday Bell was added, and in recent years the Washington, D. C. Puerto Rico, Alaska, Hawaii, Virgin Islands, Guam and the American Samoa Bells have been added. Dedication ceremonies for the other 55 bells have been conducted through the years at the chapel.

Mrs. Michael VanBeuren is the Rhode Island State chairman at Valley Forge and Mrs. Milton J. Picou is the Rhode Island Bell committee chairman. A reception and tea will be after the bell ceremonies in the Valley Forge Museum under the chairmanship of Mrs. Franklin B. Wildman, hostess for the Valley Forge Historical Society.

Swedesburg Was Founded 249 Years Ago

The community of Swedesburg in Upper Merion township, one of Montgomery county's oldest settlements along the Schuylkill River, is observing its 249th year of discovery by Swedish colonists and its 128th anniversary of attainment as a recognized but unincorporated town in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Swedesburg, once hub of Upper Merion, was founded in 1712 by John and Gunnar Rambo, Swedish pioneers from the colony around Gloria Dei Old Swedes Church, Philadelphia. The name "Swedesburg" was officially recorded by "citizens from the vicinity of the Swedes Church" on March 13, 1833, at a meeting in the Swedesburg Inn.

Andrew Keiger, son of George Keiger, a German immigrant and soldier of the Revolutionary War, laid out the streets of Swedesburg in 1837 in a grid pattern, planning to preserve its colonial atmosphere.

The Continental Army encamped temporarily on the area which now Swedesburg when it crossed at Swedesford on Dec. 12, 1777, before moving on to Gulph Mills and Valley Forge.

Washington, Benjamin Franklin and Gen. Anthony Wayne worshipped at the Swedes Church which was founded on June 24, 1860. Its 200th anniversary last year was highlighted with a procession of an American flag by U. S. Senator Hugh Scott on behalf of President Eisenhower.

In 1876 Prince Oscar of Sweden with 100 naval cadets visited the Swedes Church. A baptismal font and flag of the Kingdoms of Norway and Sweden was presented to the church.

In 1922 Swedesburg petitioned the Montgomery County Courts for incorporation as a borough, however, due to technicalities, it was not approved. In 1927, Bridgeport voted to annex Swedesburg, but Upper Merion Supervisors objected and the State Supreme Court rendered a decision to keep Swedesburg in the township.

Sacred Heart Church, oldest Catholic congregation in Upper Merion, was founded in 1906.

During World War II, more than 200 men and women of Swedesburg served in the armed forces of the United States, six having paid the supreme sacrifice.

They chopped the hole after forcing a lock on a cellar door and gaining entrance, according to Detective Thomas Boyce, of the Northwest Division.

Boyce said the thieves must have stood on a packing crate to get at the ceiling.

After they gained entrance they forced a locked drawer under the cash register and took \$2,000.

The theft was discovered Monday morning by Miss Sarah Stein, the manager.

Boyce said the thieves probably escaped the same way they got into the store.
